Sunny Weather


This term we should see lots of sun and less rain! Should this be the case, please remember the essentials of a named hat, water bottle and plenty of sun cream applied before the start of the school day. You are welcome to send your child with a bottle of sun cream for **them to** apply themselves should they need a top up in the day. Because of the risk of allergies, this must not be shared by peers and we do not allow spray sun tan lotion because of the risk of it accidentally getting into eyes. There are slightly different arrangements for Wrens (please speak to a member of the team if you need clarification).
